Have you booked your Chocolat Treat?



Talk on Tuesday, 29 October 2019, at 7pm in The Orangery

This really will be a treat, because Camila Westphal Valenti (pictured) from Artisan du Chocolat will not only tell us the inside story of producing artisan chocolate from plant to palate, but you will also have the chance to taste some of their very superior chocolate; we are exploring whether we can seat people at round tables in the Orangery.



Come and hear chocolatey tales from 'conching' and refining their own chocolate to sending chocolate gingers into space and supplying treats to three Michelin-starred restaurants. The chocolatier business was founded in 2000, and it is still a hands-on process in the atelier in the Kent countryside.

I asked one of Artisan du Chocolat's experts at which point the distinctive aroma was evident in chocolate: you can smell it as soon as you enter the shop. She knew, and I was fascinated by the explanation. I thought you ought to have the chance to hear about it too.

Silent Howlers

You have probably noticed the three silent children adorning the Napoleon Garden, and wondered about them. They are thought provoking.

These bronze sculptures were created by Laura Ford and are said to be 'faithful representations of fantasy, with sometimes bitter-sweet and menacing qualities mixed with tenderness.' Her talent is the accuracy with which she captures stance, body language and gesture to imply misery, all without any glimpse of the face. The group of

weeping, sulking girls are named *Silent Howlers*.

Just look at the detail: slumped bodies, hair obscuring the face, and arms crossed protectively, all poses that incite sympathy and emotional connection. They are both charming and a little unsettling, but that seems to make observers want to get close to them to try to understand more. They

are certainly attracting a great deal of interest.

Old tiled dairy

The Friends have worked with the Council to install protection for these historic tiles. Even protection has to be carried out under the guidance of a conservation architect. The Council have been most helpful, and we hope that, in time, the fabric of the structure can be restored, and the tiles and stone shelves conserved. The room is currently being used as a café storeroom, and the tiles are being irreparably worn away.

Before the official tape-cutting, the formal opening party had their turn. Not for a long time have I seen so many grown-ups have such fun. The Mayor on the see-saw, councillors on the zip wire, and a whole lot of us on the ‘viper snake swing’. Shame we had to hand it over to the rightful ‘owners’: the children.

The pathways and bridge are fully accessible, with a wheelchair-accessible roundabout and accessible swings. The design was created in accordance with the response from a public consultation.

Tile conservation

Conservation work was delayed but is now due to start in late September on the tiles under the arches outside the café.

This is a great result from much hard work by the RBKC officers involved.

Holland House conservation

We have not heard anything officially, but gather that the proposed conservation work on the house is close to approval. We await a start date as there is only a small window of opportunity for the work to be done while the opera is off site during the winter.



Launch of the Adventure Playground

Erosion

You will notice that wire fences have been erected to the west of the North Lawn and also in the south east corner. These are temporary and intended to prevent further erosion and tree compaction until ‘impenetrable’ planting can provide protection. At that point the fences will be removed.

Adventure playground

The newly built playground was opened on Friday 19 July, to the delight of a group of children waiting impatiently at the gate. The minute the Mayor of the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea, Cllr Will Pascall, cut the tape, he had to stand aside to let the avalanche of little folk rush in, all excited to try out the new equipment.

Protective fencing has also been agreed around the trees to the north of the Sun Trap Lawn. There used to be chestnut fencing there, but it was removed and, as a consequence, cut-through paths are compacting the tree roots, wearing away the under-storey plants, and creating bare paths across the lawn itself.

Alert! Works in the Park

Work on improvement never stops. Sometimes this means areas of the park you like to visit will be closed for a short time. Here's what to look out for:

1. Resurfacing of the paths in the Dutch Garden will commence on Wednesday, 9 October, and will take around three weeks.
2. Opera Holland Park will vacate the Holland House site on schedule in September, but the area might be closed to the public for a short while, due to snagging works required by Park Management. We hope those grey 'Dalek' structures that cover the canopy anchor points will be painted in a more appropriate colour.
3. Repairs to the gravel surfaces in the Fukushima Garden will take place sometime around mid-September to early October.
4. The road leading from Ilchester Place to the Duchess of Bedford Gate needs resurfacing to make it fit once again for the heavy use it bears. The first stage is for trial pits to be excavated in order to explore what is under the road and therefore to determine exactly what works are needed.
5. The path that runs up from the Sun Trap entrance is cracking badly. We know the ground around that area is always shifting, hence the big retaining wall in the Sun Trap garden, and trial pits are planned to provide more information on the nature of the shift. Remedial work can then be proposed.
6. New, bat-friendly lighting will be installed along the path between the Ecology Centre and the car park.

Lots of necessary work on paths....now it's time to focus on the green elements of the park.

We were fortunate to have sunshine for the launch of Holland Park's Nature, Health and Wellbeing initiative on Saturday, 17 August. The Ecology Service had organised healthy activities, such as outdoor yoga and mindfulness, which sought to raise awareness of the natural green surroundings.

Regular conservation volunteers did some energetic work scything the Arboretum: keeping the grass short will encourage wild flowers in the pollinator meadow around the bee hives. Probably the most popular offer was the smoothie bike. Visitors, large and small, pedalled away on the static bike to create their own smoothie: a healthy, super-charged drink

which they then got to enjoy.

The Friends had a stall alongside Ecology's pitch where we engaged visitors in conversations about the park, what we do to support it, and we offered them the challenge of locating the leaves of 10 different tree types. The only tree many could not find was the *Ginkgo biloba*, but you all know where it is, don't you? Lots of children asked when we will next have a pop-up stall with things for them to do, and The Friends will be back in the Café Yard on Tuesday, 22 October, during half term (*see p.11*).

There is increasing and well-documented evidence of the health benefits of natural green space, with research claiming that time spent among trees can lower cortisol (a stress hormone) levels, boost the immune system and reduce anxiety. Focus on health whilst amongst trees offers us a double bonus. So we must appreciate and care for the park's trees for the enjoyment and wellbeing of the local community. We must also remain aware that this concept is based on quiet activities in the tranquillity of natural surroundings. It is not about sport in the woodlands, which would completely miss the point and disturb the peace so many appreciate.

Ten Fascinating Facts about Owls



Zoë Smith, Urban Peregrine Project Officer at the Hawk & Owl Trust, talked with enthusiasm about these fascinating raptors. It was all interesting, but tawny owls particularly so because they are a species that can be found in Holland Park and might breed there, though this is not certain. The talk on 8 August was well attended, much enjoyed, and extended due to the many questions asked. Zoë told us that:



*Tawny owl as shown in our guide book:
The Birds of Holland Park*

- The female is noticeably larger than the male, as with all birds of prey.
- Their wings are adapted to allow silent flight, which avoids alerting their prey.
- There used to be historical superstition about owls, due to their night-time habit and the strange noise they make. Now they are a much loved bird.

- Owls have one ear higher than the other to increase their range of hearing.
- They hunt by listening for their prey, so urban noise reduces their ability to find food.
- They often stand on one leg to rest the other.
- Tawny owls have 'amber status' on the Birds of Conservation Concern list of endangered birds in the UK. They are in decline due to climate change and tree loss.
- Tawny owls are adapting to feed on passerines instead of their usual diet of rodents.
- The iris in the owl's eye dilates at night to let in more light and improve night vision.

- When the female tawny is brooding, she will not tolerate the male in the nest with her.

The talk was sponsored by The Friends, so that attendance could be free. Check out the Ecology Service website (www.rbkc.gov.uk/ecology) for further talks and events in 2019, including a bird-ringing demonstration on Saturday, 12 October, and The Friends' autumn bird walk, led by ornithologist Bill Haines, on Saturday, 9 November.

But apple trees are as individual as people, and whether I will find the small sour crab apples that produce the tangiest jelly, I will not know until I go searching. Also, last year for the first time, two separate friends gave me quinces of different sizes and shapes, but both made jelly that was commended by those who tasted it. I have not yet heard from those people as I write at the beginning of September, but hope I will. 
Payment in the Holland Park Car Park

Some members and visitors are puzzled that the car park meters no longer take cash. This saves the cost of emptying the machines and means they are of no interest to the light fingered who cost the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea up to £120,000 a year from theft. By 2020 all existing parking meters in the borough will be replaced by PayByPhone and


this includes Holland Park’s car park, which will change over in October 2019.

Most of the Friends’ events are in the evening and the car park is free after 6.30pm, so this will not apply. If you want to park during the day, you need to bring your phone and a credit card. Here’s how you do it:


How to Park with PayByPhone




1 Download the PayByPhone app from the App Store or Google Play.



2 Enter your location code. Select the suggested nearest location code or enter the location code found on the nearby PayByPhone signage.



3 Enter your parking duration. Enter the length of time you wish to park and check your details before confirming your selection.



4 Extend your parking anytime. Add more time from wherever you are. Simply open the app and press ‘extend’.

There are alternatives if you don’t wish to download the app:

- Pay online at www.park.paybyphone.com
- Call the telephone number shown on the parking signage and follow instructions
- Text 65565 and enter the location shown on the parking signage.

RBKC is the first borough in the UK to join PayByPhone’s ‘Meters for Trees’ programme so that the borough benefits from a donation of one new tree for every 10 meters, and the world climate benefits by donations made to verified projects combatting deforestation in the Amazon.

Holland House Ballroom?

Geoffrey Brown sent the Friends a photo of this charming painting. He told us that it was painted by his step-grandfather, George Rich, who died in 1929, and is said to be of the ballroom at Holland House in the 1920s. The Local Studies Department in the Kensington Central Library studied the photo but could not find anything in their records to say



categorically that it is the ballroom. However, note that the artist's name was Rich, so there might be a link with the family that owned Holland House, but they sold it in the early 18th century, so this is a bit of a mystery. This costs you nothing, but means the tax man will give the Friends an extra 25% on all your donations and subscriptions until you cancel it. So if you have not yet given us a declaration, **your order**

form will be green, and you will find a declaration on the back. Please read the conditions carefully, though the main one is that you pay UK income tax. If your order form is white, you have signed in the past and you do not need to repeat. If you tell us that you are not eligible, we mark your record accordingly and will try not to ask you again.




Holland Park is generally a safe place, but we should never be complacent. If you see any antisocial behaviour, such as vandalism, please contact the Parks Police on:
